



# Friday 11<sup>th</sup> October 1878 (Page 3) MORWELL

(FROM A CORRESPONDENT)

Morwell is to be one of the most prosperous towns on the line of railway between Sale and Melbourne. That is, it would appear so from the confidence people seem to have in it. Not a day but there are some new arrivals, either selectors or intending purchasers. This tends to give the place quite a lively appearance. Several of the land lots have changed hands since the sale; it is to be hoped for the better for all parties. Mr **Green** of Rosedale is erecting a building for drapery business.

The road to the Tarwin is much improved by the dry weather of last week, but I fear this morning's rain will make it bad again. The contract for the clearing of the road from the Ridge to the township is not progressing favourably.

Where are our Severance committee? Or what are they doing? I hope they will not fail to accomplish what they have taken in hand.

I wish someone would agitate for the erection of a new school. The department say they have no funds available for that purpose; really the present school accommodation is something disgraceful. I am surprised that the present teacher has remained so long in it. \*Miss M' Coorg, who has been the teacher here for the last twelve months, has, I am sure, experienced great inconvenience for want of proper accommodation, and she deserves great credit for the manner in which she has conducted the school throughout. It is a pity either the department or the inhabitants do not provide her with a better building.

# St. Philip's on the Hill (Anglican) Morwell East

The contract to build St. Philip's was entered into in June 1952, construction beginning in September.

The church building was located in Barry St., near Vincent Road, the opening and dedication took place at 2.30 pm on Saturday, 28th. March 1953. The ceremony was conducted by the Bishop of Gippsland, Rt. Rev. **D. B. Blackwood**.

The building was of weatherboard construction with a tile roof, the designer was Mr. **S.P. Ashton** of Maffra, and the builder: Mr. **S. G. Winchester**, of Morwell.

The church was situated on a parcel of land measuring approximately two acres, the site having been purchased from the Housing Commission at a cost of £2,600. Construction costs were approximately £5,000.

The first services at St. Philip's were conducted on 5th. April 1953 - Easter Sunday. Service times were 11 a.m. and 7 p.m.

Friday

The usual fortnightly meeting of the committee of the Mechanics' Institute was held in the rooms of the Institute last Friday evening. Owing to the inclement weather there was a very small attendance, \*their being just enough to form a quorum.

The secretary reported that he had ordered about one hundred and sixty volumes, and that the trustees of the Melbourne Public Library have granted them a loan of one hundred and thirty volumes. Rules for guidance of members were also made. We hope to have the library in working order in a short time.

It is the intention of the committee of the Anglican church to build a brick church forthwith. The bricks have already been ordered and the foundation stone will shortly be laid. This shows that the Rev. Mr. **Walker** has great confidence in the future of Morwell. It is to be hoped he will have every success and that the residents of Morwell will help him by responding liberally.

Speaking of buildings, a local contractor informed me that he has the contracts for erecting four new wooden buildings.

I hear Mr. **Murdoch's** hall has been let to Mr. D. **M'Mullan**, draper of your town. Mr. M'Mullan has secured a fine building and in the best part of the township, and should do very well here. The announcement of his arrival is anxiously looked for.

It is about time the local State school had a fence around it, and the school house and residence painted outside. Owing to the number of cattle passing to and from the township, it is a source of great danger to the children, but I suppose the department will not take any action till an accident occurs, which will be sooner or later.

As for painting the school it is time that was done it being the dirtiest looking place in the town, looking for all the world as if smallpox or measles had passed over the town and settled on the buildings.



- The Rotary Club of Morwell was established on 31st July 1945.
- Church Street Fire Station was officially opened on 17<sup>th</sup> July 1953.
- Methodist Church (Morwell East): temporary building officially opened on Sunday 24<sup>th</sup> July 1955.
- The Morwell Co-Op began trading in July 1955.
- Extensive renovations to the Morwell & District Community Hospital were opened on 1<sup>st</sup> July 1956.
- Crinigan Road Primary School (No. 4692) was opened in July 1957.
- The Latrobe Valley Hotel was officially opened at 4 pm on Monday 7<sup>th</sup> July 1958.
- The ANZ Bank announced the demolition and re-development of their Commercial Road building in July 1958.
- The provision of town gas was implemented on 23<sup>rd</sup> July 1959.
- The State Savings Bank of Victoria opened a branch in Church Street in July 1960.
- Murdoch's Hotel was sold to Woolworth's in July 1964.
- The Morwell Public Library (Hazelwood Road) was opened on 15<sup>th</sup> July 1966.



#### It Happened in August!

(A selection of events that took place during the month of August)

- Maryvale Ridge School (No. 1939) was opened on 17<sup>th</sup> August 1877.
- Alexandra Park was officially opened by Cr. O'Grady in August 1904.
- The Cricketer's Arms Hotel was demolished in August 1932.
- St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church Hall (Elgin Street) was officially opened in August 1947.
- Coles Variety Store opened in Tarwin Street on Thursday10<sup>th</sup> August 1950.
- The Presbyterian Church in Morwell East (St. Columba's) was opened on 1<sup>st</sup> August 1953.
- The Woolworth's Store in Commercial Road was officially opened on 25<sup>th</sup> August 1955.
- The Panoramic Drive-In (Latrobe Road) was opened on 30<sup>th</sup> August 1956.
- The National Bank opened their Princes Highway premises on 29<sup>th</sup> August 1958.
- Murdoch's Hotel closed its doors for the last time on Saturday 29<sup>th</sup> August 1964.
- L.M. Ericsson's Morwell plant (Winifred & Church Streets) was established in August 1967.
- The Victor Street telephone exchange building was opened on 24<sup>th</sup> August 1973.
- The Latrobe Regional Hospital was established in August 1998.
- The Olympic Torch visited Morwell on 7<sup>th</sup> & 8<sup>th</sup> August 2000.
- Bronze bust of Sir Stanley Savige was unveiled on 31<sup>st</sup> August 2006.



#### Historical Notes

Morwell residents were provided with their first regular communication facilities in August, 1870, with the establishment of a post office, and a mail coach service that operated between Melbourne and Sale, six times a week.

A public telegraph office was provided at Morwell in August, 1879, greatly speeding communication for residents.

A public telephone was provided at Morwell in 1908. It was linked by trunk line to the Sale Exchange, 40 miles distant. A local exchange was provided at Morwell Post Office about 1910, and by 1912, there were six subscribers.

The manual exchange was replaced by an automatic exchange, on 20th February, 1955. The new exchange was located in Margaret Street, and employed the "Step by Step" system of switching. It had an initial capacity of 1,200 lines.

On the 20th November, 1969, the contract for the construction of a four storey exchange building, to be erected in Victor Street, was awarded to Lewis Construction Co. Pty. Ltd., of North Melbourne. The building is of brick, steel and concrete construction, and provides an overall floor area of approximately 22,620 sq. feet. It was designed and supervised by the Commonwealth Department of Works. The building houses three separate exchanges — a 4,000 line exchange for local calls, that also acts as the parent exchange for a number of smaller exchanges in the district, providing them with access to S.T.D. facilities; a 1,600 line trunk exchange; and a manual exchange to provide manual assistance facilities. The capacity of the exchanges can be increased when the need arises.

# Morwell Advertiser 17th. August 1900 Welcome Home

### **RETURN OF PRIVATE G. PETTIT**

Private Geo. **Pettit**, of Morwell, one of the members of the Second Contingent to South Africa, returned (invalided) on Saturday night, and received a most hearty welcome.

There was a tremendous crowd at the railway station-the platform being packed from one end to the other- when the 9 p.m. train steamed in. A number of Rangers were in the first part of the train and there was a general rush there to get a glimpse of the returned soldier. After a deal of crushing pushing, etc., they were disappointed to find that Pettit was not where they expected. Corporal **Bruton**, however, discovered the returned one in a carriage near the van, and on a cheer going up from that quarter there was a general stampede in that direction, with more crushing etc.

On stepping on the platform Private Pettit was lifted shoulder high and the cheering was most enthusiastic and deafening, whilst a number of Rangers fired several volleys.

An adjournment was afterwards made to the Mechanics' hall, which was crowded, there being also present about 50 Rangers including Privates **Colley**- who had a remarkable escape at Rensburg, where he was left 25 hours for dead-**Tackabury** and **Streitberg**, who were invalided home recently. On entering the hall "Home Sweet Home" was sung.

In proposing Pvt. Pettit's health, Lieut. **Hall** said they had met to welcome home a true and noble soldier who had gone to South Africa to fight for the Queen and the Empire. Private Pettit was no doubt sorry that in consequence of sickness he had been obliged to return home before his comrades, but whilst at the front, he had acquitted himself in a manner which is proof that men of to-day are able to perform deeds of valour and heroism equal to the traditions of their forefathers whilst serving under the grand old flag which, although tattered and torn by shot and shell, has thank God, never been disgraced.

It afforded them much pleasure to welcome Private Pettit home, but it was nothing to the reception they intended to give him and his comrades when they all returned.

The toast was drunk with musical honors.

In responding Pvt. Pettit said he never expected such a "welcome home," and he sincerely thanked all for the kindness extended to him.

The health of Privates Colley, Tackabury and Streitberg was proposed by Cr. **Vary** who said that what had been said regarding Private Pettit could also be said of those whose health he had much pleasure in proposing. Much was expected of the men when they left for the front, but they had accomplished far more than was ever expected. A better body of men could not be got together than those who had gone, and they had proved themselves worthy of the highest admiration.

Private Colley, on behalf of his comrades, responded, and in doing so returned thanks for the hearty manner their health had been honored. He said they were all glad to go, and glad to get back again. Whilst at the front they got as much as they wanted, and he got more than he wanted at Rensburg.

Proceedings were brought to a close with the singing of Auld Lang Syne.

Private Pettit looks remarkably well and is now nearly two stone heavier than when he left for the front. He was two months in the hospital and at times his condition was very critical. He states that the Australians have had a very rough time of it at the front.





\*An <u>unofficial</u> Post Office was established at the S.E.C.V. "Ridge" workers' hostel on **1st. May 1951**. The name Morwell Heights was chosen in preference to Morwell Ridge as it was considered that reference to the word "Ridge" might cause some historical confusion.

The officer- in- charge at the facility was Mr. **R. Jones**, a former Post Master at Boolarra.
