





Obituary

Monday 6^{th.} December 1954 (page 4)

MR. C. W. M. (CLARRIE) SMITH

THE death occurred (suddenly) on November 30th, of Morwell-born World War 1 veteran, Mr. **Clarence William Mitchell Smith**, at his residence, Church St., following a severe heart attack while at work.

Son of Mrs. **E M. Smith** and the late Mr. **William Smith**, deceased was born at Morwell in 1894, and received his education at the local State School. On leaving school he learnt the plumbing trade under the late Mr. **J. Bryden**, and, later, blacksmithing with the late Mr. **John Rintoull** and **G. Dayble**.

He enlisted in 1915 in the 39th Battalion of the Third Australian Division, and arrived in England in 1916. During his service in France he was wounded several times and carried a piece of shrapnel in his arm through later life.

Returning to Australia, he embarked in a plumbing business in his parents' premises, now occupied by **Gude's** Garage, confining himself mainly to this type of work on district farms. He was later engaged in the building trade, and for eleven years was employed with the lines staff of the Postmaster General's Department. In recent years he was assisting Mr. **Fred Murray** in the furniture removing business.

In the sphere of sport, as a young man, he was a track cyclist, and in later life confined himself to angling and field shooting, of which he was an outstanding exponent.

The remains were interred in the Hazelwood Cemetery on Thursday following services in the Presbyterian Church and at the graveside, conducted by Rev. Alan Thomson.

The large number of mourners and the array of floral tributes were the physical expression of the high regard in which he was held by a wide circle of friends. Members of the Morwell Fire Brigade attended in uniform in respect of the memory of one of the original members of the Brigade, which also paid tribute by flying its station flag at half-mast.






MORWELL DISTRICT SERVICEMEN AND WOMEN

Rob de Souza-Daw is seeking information on the names of service personnel who had a connection with the Morwell district and are buried or listed on a memorial in Thailand of Singapore. Please advise Rob if you know of any.

Morwell's first swimming pool was constructed in 1925 on the strip of land in Commercial Road, beside Swimming the railway line and opposite the State School. It seems that this convenient though narrow open area was called "Alexandra Park", no doubt so named after Queen Alexandra, consort of King Edward VII.



The Olympic swimming pool in Brookes Park was built in 1956.



Sir Norman Brookes, or "The Wizard" as he was known, was the first foreign man to win Wimbledon, in 1907. Brookes was known for his clever, all-court game, a mixture of solid ground strokes backed up by a well-varied serve. Brookes won his home major in 1911 and three years later captured the singles and doubles titles at Wimbledon. It was the first time he'd returned to the All England Club since his first win there seven years earlier. More doubles success followed in the United States in 1919 and Australia in 1924. Following his retirement, Brookes became a renowned tennis administrator, president of the Lawn Tennis Association of Australia from 1926 to 1955. The men's singles trophy at the Australian Open, the Norman Brookes Challenge Cup, is named in his honour. [Website – viewed July 28, 2015]

ALLEGED BREACH OF PROMISE.

MELBOURNE, Monday. The Argus - Tuesday, July 25, 1922

Both sides were subjected to a spirited cross-examination today in the case in which Mrs Minnie Ingram, a soldier's widow, of Erskineville, Sydney, is suing Joseph Henry Buckley), a farmer, of Morwell, for £3000 damages, for alleged breach of promise of mar- riage. Mrs Ingram is 30 years of age, and Buckley, In his evidence, said to day that he was 73 years of age Mrs Ingram said that Buckley asked her to marry him. She had agreed, but he had failed to carry out the promise. Cross examined by Mr Cussen (for Buckley), Mrs Ingram said that she looked upon marriage us a contract in which love and affection had to play some part. Mr Cussen Then what point did your love for Buckley first begin to kindle? I never really loved him I did not say so.

When did your eve begin to sparkle and your pulse to beat at his coming? I was fond enough of him.

Did you learn to love him as the result of letters between you? 1 was very sorry for him.

Oh yes, I am sorry for him today, but that is not the feeling to which I refer. I could not love him so very dearly, I had one of the best boys that over lived.

Joseph Henry Buckley said that when Mrs Ingram wag coming to Melbourne she sent him a telegram.

Mr Cussen She says that on Boxing Day you talked to her of marriage. There was abso-lutely no reference to it on my part, but she kept on throwing out hints Shé says that you asked her, and she said I cannot forget my husband. Nothing of the kind.

The hearing will be resumed tomorrow.




