

Friday 7^{th.} February 1896 Removal of the Morwell Railway Gates


Much surprise and consternation has been expressed since it became known that it is the intention of the Railway Department to remove the local railway gates kept by Mrs **Bryden**, and substitute cow-pits in their stead. Such an act is considered by the townspeople and others, most absurd and quite impracticable, in consequence of the amount of danger attending it. The traffic on both sides of the line is considerable, to say nothing about the number of school children and other persons who daily cross the line, and as there is a great deal of shunting done opposite the gates, makes the suggestion all the more erroneous, and the idea of such a thing has preyed so much upon the minds of some of our local residents that they have predicted and pictured to us several gruesome spectacles such as pieces of horse flesh, hair, and bones together with bread, meat, vegetables, &c, scattered about, also the mutilated bodies of butchers, bakers, farmers and others; the other scenes anticipated are equally as hideous – the brains and other portions of school children, grown up persons, cattle, sheep, &c., &., can be strewn along the line and across the street almost from **Date's** shop to the Post Office.

All this some of our foreseeing townspeople aver will undoubtedly take place if the gates are removed, and it is quite possible that many accidents might occur, for people in vehicles and others on foot will get careless and too venturesome, consequently they will be rushing across in front of trains which may no doubt often prove fatal. It is possible if the Department are made fully aware of the amount of danger the people will have to risk, they will not carry out their intentions and not be like the man who "shut the gate after the horses had gone." We understand that a petition is to be presented by our member, Mr. **F. C. Mason**, before the Commissioners and we trust it may have the desired effect.

However, apart from the danger of the gates being removed everyone will regret the removal of Mrs **Bryden** and her family from our midst, and we feel sure that their many kind and courteous actions will not be forgotten. Mrs **Bryden** has had charge of the gates for nearly eight years, and was always most attentive and obliging in carrying out her duties on all days and at all hours.

If the Morwell gates are closed there will only be two gates on the line between Sale and Warragul, viz. at Traralgon and Moe.

Friday 22^{nd.} March 1912 DEATH OF MRS M.A.KEEGAN

It is with feelings of very deep regret that we have to chronicle the death of another early colonist, and old pioneer of the district, in the person of Mrs **Mary Ann Keegan**, relic of the late Mr **Phillip Keegan**, of Morwell, which sad event took place at her late residence on Wednesday morning.

Deceased, who had passed the allotted span of three score years and ten, was born in the town of Carmichael, a few miles from Ayr, Scotland, in 1835. At the age of 22, she married the late Mr Phillip Keegan, and six weeks later the young couple resolved to set out for Australia. The undertaking in those days was no small thing and was frought with considerable danger but that did not deter Mr and Mrs Keegan from making a journey of several thousand miles across the great deep, in the then small and slow going vessels. In place of the trip occupying between five and six weeks, as at present, the boat in which Mrs Keegan and her husband sailed took exactly 90 days to reach Adelaide.

A few months later found them on Kangaroo Island. They, however, did not remain long there, for hearing of good accounts from Victoria, they journeyed to Melbourne, where they remained for about twelve months before moving to Sunbury where Mr Keegan was employed on the newly made railway, their home being on opposite side of creek to the present residence of Sir **Rupert Clark**. Mrs Keegan and her husband also spent some time in the Castlemaine and Guildford districts, where the latter was engaged on railway works.

Thirty five years ago, the late Mrs Keegan followed her brothers (Messrs **John** and **James McDonald**, who pre-deceased her), on a trip to Gippsland in search of land. The railway line was not finished and the last part of the journey was completed in a coach.

There was no township here at that time, but the late Mr John Quigley had a small store in a bark hut, and a few tents were scattered about. Land was being selected on all sides and Mrs Keegan acquired a block of 32 acres, adjacent to the township, the greater part of which she still owned at the time of her death. When the Mirboo line was constructed, Mrs Keegan's husband, who was then permanently employed by the Railway Department, was transferred to Morwell and appointed ganger on the first section of the said line. As the township grew Mrs Keegan's property increased in value and portion of it was cut up and sold in building allotments. Mrs Keegan also had a number of houses built which advanced the township considerably.

The deceased lady was the last member of her family, all her brothers and sisters, as well as husband having pre-deceased her. She was the mother of seven sons and three daughters, five sons (Messrs John, Phillip, Anthony, Thomas and James) are still living and one daughter (Mrs Cummins).

Deceased, by her kindly and generous disposition had a large circle of friends and was most highly esteemed by all with whom she came in contact. In cases of sickness and trouble she was always to the fore and her valuable help and advice was always much sought after, especially in the early days before there was a settled doctor in the district, and her memory will ever be revered by a host of persons to whom she was a blessing.

The remains of deceased were interred in the Hazelwood Cemetery, yesterday, the funeral cortege leaving Sacred Heart Church where requiem mass was celebrated for the repose of her soul. The Rev. **Dean Colman** officiated at the grave, the mortuary arrangements being carried out by Mr **Wm. Turner**.







It Happened in November!

- The Morwell Soldiers' Memorial Fund Committee was established in November 1919.






It Happened in December!
