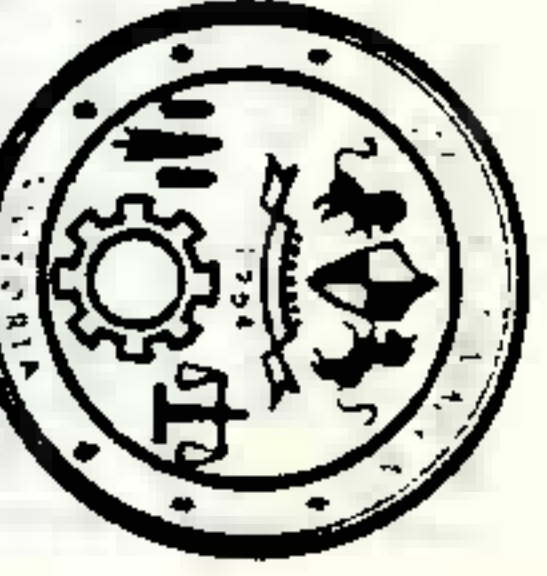

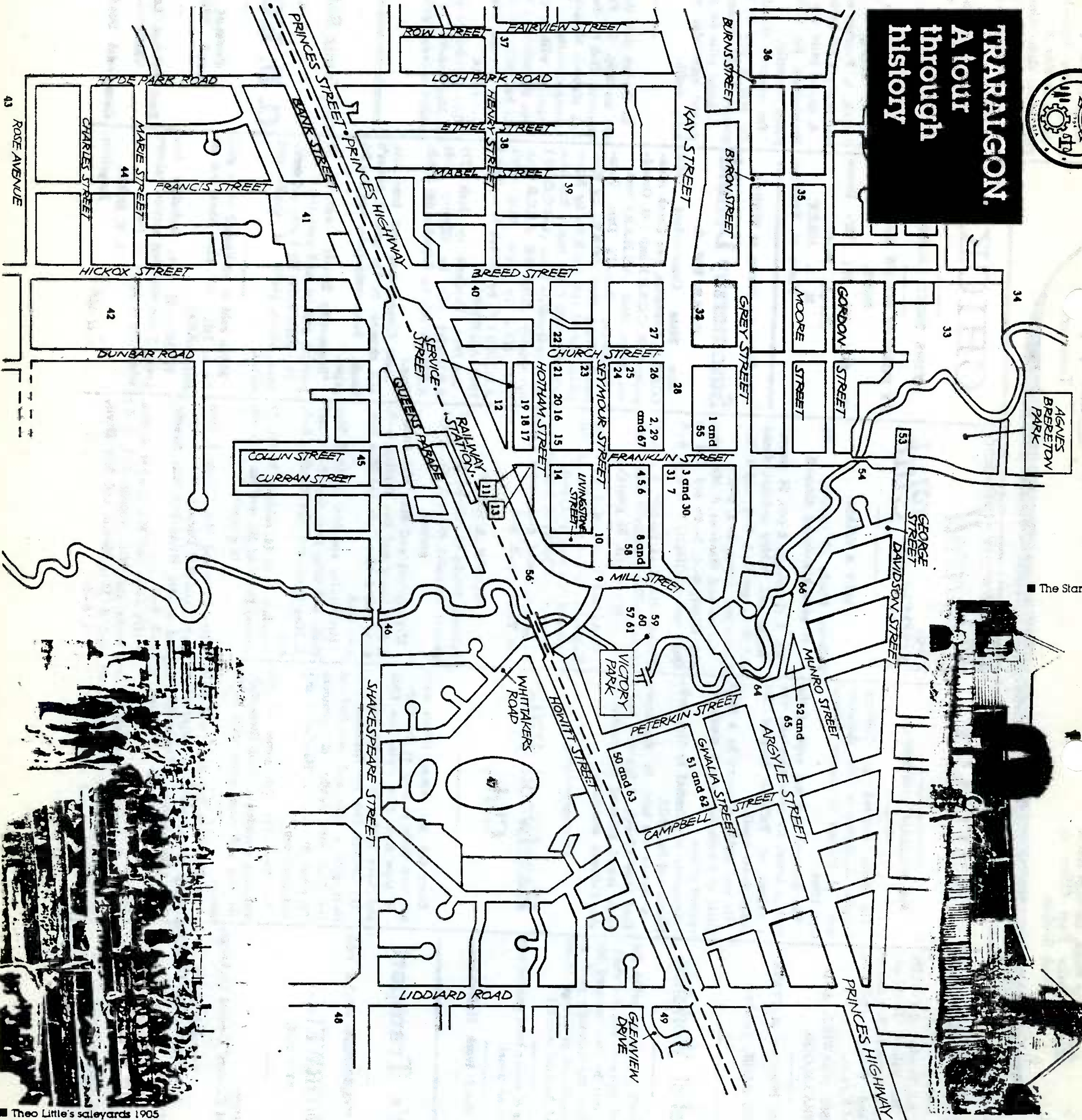

**Walking Tour 1**

Commences at the Post Office

**1. Ryans Hotel**  
Classified by the National Trust. Built in 1914 on the site of Duncan Campbell's Travelers Rest Hotel. Traralgon's first hotel built in 1858

**2. Traralgon Post Office and Court House**  
Built in 1887. Also classified by the National Trust.

**3. The Bus Stand**  
Outside the Plaza is the approximate site of the first Shire Hall, built in 1881. It served as the Council Chambers until 1926, then the office of the Waterworks Trust until 1959. It then became home to our elderly citizens until it was demolished in the late 1970's

**4. Trickey's**  
Oswald Marriage built his store here in 1872. In 1908 the Gippsland Trading Company erected a building with an imposing tower. Over the years it has been occupied by traders, such as Patersons Pty Ltd, Clausens, CIG and more recently Magnum Video

**5. Florist Shop**  
Originally the Rubicon Hotel

**6. SEC Gippsland Office**  
Site of Edward Kaye's second Star Hotel, a two storied building. The Argyle Lodge met upstairs and it was known as the Masonic Hall

**7. Opposite**  
Richard Mackay, an adventurer/estate agent and businessman conducted the Traralgon Club and Coffee Palace

**8. Wesley Church**  
Behind it the original church is still used as a hall. Here in 1848 Thomas Windsor erected his home. Until Duncan Campbell built the Travellers Rest, Windsor's House provided the only accommodation in the vicinity of Hobson's run

**9. Mill Street**  
This led to Peterkan's Mill. It was situated behind the area of the elderly Citizens Club building, where great red gums logs were cut into scantling and blocks to build the homes and streets of Melbourne

**10. Crossing Seymour Street to Livingstone Street**  
Crossing Seymour Street and proceeding through Livingstone Street we approach the site of the first permanent baths, now a car park. Before this, the only place to swim was in two large holes in the creek, one in the vicinity of the Shakespeare Street bridge, and the other behind Agnes Brereton Park.

**11. The Grand Junction Hotel**  
The original building was erected by E. C. Miller in 1884. Built from local bricks, its first licensee was a flamboyant character, Cornelius Neville. He had ran a hotel in Waihalla prior to coming to Traralgon. Later he conducted the Grand Terminus Hotel in Baimsdale. The Junction Hotel enjoyed vice regal patronage on at least two occasions in its early history. The most notable was probably that of the visit of the Earl of Hoptown in 1894, the then Governor of Victoria. He was to eventually become the first Governor General of Australia. Until recently the hotel was, for many years, owned by the McGauran family

**12. Service Station**  
Cobbledicks Building, erected about 1908, stood here until the early 1960's. It was an imposing two storied structure and the home for many businesses over the years

**13. Opportunity Shop**  
Formerly Layton's Building, these premises were for years Traralgon's most prominent general store. From the early 1900's to the early 1930's it was conducted by Layton Bros and then by the W. A. Purvis Stores. Later it became a furniture emporium. In the section adjoining the Hotel, A. A. Errington conducted a ladies store for many years

**14. ANZ Banking Group**  
Formerly The Bank of Australasia

**15. Keith Williams Estate Agency**  
Formerly the site of the Club Hotel built by Geo Hickox in 1876. It was delicensed in the 1930's. James Rogers built a furniture store on the site and further along in Hotham Street, at number 16, a hay and corn store

**17. AMP Building**  
Site of the first Mechanics Institute. It later became an emporium, ladies hairdresser and milliner

**18. Site of State Savings Bank of Victoria**

**19. State Offices**  
Site of the second Mechanics Institute built in 1884 and the Town Hall built in 1925. In the 1930's and 40's magnificent balls were conducted in the Town Hall, with people travelling from all over Gippsland to attend

**20. Roland Building**  
Today a shopping and office complex. Over the years a livery stable, coach works and motor garage have occupied this site. The present building is named after a former owner, the late Mr Roland Hill, who for many years conducted the local GMH dealership as well as being a prominent citizen of the town

**21. Carnival Area**  
Here in the 1930's and 40's the carnivals would set up with their 'Housy Housy', lucky envelopes, merry-go-rounds, etc

**22. First Baptist Church**  
On north west corner opposite Wight's Nissan

**23. Second Masonic Lodge**  
Portion of the second Masonic Lodge is still visible. The Lodge now occupies the premises built by GLV10, Gippsland's first TV Station

**24. Billy Guyatts**  
Here in 1879/80 Thomas Moorhouse, a Church of England Lay Preacher, with the help of others, notably William Whittakers, erected the first St James Church. This remarkable man, who until his arrival in 1879 had never been on horseback, rode all over the district bringing his faith and encouragement to the struggling settlers. In 1925 the original building was replaced by a brick structure. In 1970 the site was sold to C. J. Coles and a New World Supermarket was erected on the site. In 1985 it was sold to Billy Guyatts. The first St James Church was erected in Grey Street Traralgon. It incorporates a beautiful stained glass window from the old church

**25. Car Park**  
The St James Hall and tennis courts were situated here

**26. St Andrews**  
Erected in 1914, it is the second church. The first was situated on the corner of Peterkan and Gwalia Streets

**27. St Michaels**  
First erected in 1883, it was rebuilt in 1936 and enlarged in 1978, when the beautiful stained glass windows were added

**28. Memorial Elms**  
Estimated time 60 minutes

**Heritage Drive**

**29. Traralgon Post Office and Court House (1886)**

**30. Site of Shire Hall (1881)** was Traralgon's first public building

**31. Fire Station (1921)**, an earlier station was situated near the railway station. Traralgon City Plaza now on site 30 and 31

**32. Saleyards of Little & Co** where today is sited Traralgon Civic Centre and City Offices

**33. Chinamen's Market Gardens** on Traralgon Creek, now sports playing fields.

**34. Traralgon Park Homestead**, Land surrounding now much reduced in size but one of the earlier Runs in the district

**35. Cumnock Private Hospital**

**36. New St James Church**, A beautiful stained glass window from the old church has been incorporated

**37. Water Tower**, source of water supply early 1900's

**38. Nurse Millar's Private Hospital** in Henry Street

**39. Mary Grant-Bruce**, the famous author of the Billabong Books lived here. Her parents lived one street down

**40. Site of Traralgon Bowling and Croquet Clubs**, now shopping complex

**41. Site of Brick Works and Clay Pit**, now Duncan Cameron Reserve

**42. Traralgon Special Development School** originally known as 'Coonda Hill'

**43. Original Railway Reservoir and Water Supply**. This area also Shire Pound and early Town Tip. A favourite spot for children, known as 'Kickhorse Canyon'. It is proposed site for Botanical Gardens

**44. 'Dalkeith' Memorial Home** for Elderly Citizens was bequeathed to the City in memory of Grace Bruce, wife of Mr W. M. Bruce

**45. 'Ewington'** was also a private hospital in 1920's and 1930's

**46. Cordial Factory Bridge** derived from the Cordial Factory once situated here

**47. Traralgon Recreation Reserve and Showgrounds**, Agricultural Society formed in 1885 and Traralgon Football Club in 1881

**48. Traralgon High School** built after old premises in Grey Street became overcrowded

**49. Homestead site of Leah Liddiard**, a pioneer of renown in this district

**50. Site of first school building**, now a Nursing Home

**51. Site of first Presbyterian Church (1878)**. Was the first brick building in Traralgon. Also Presbyterian Manse (1890)

**52. Star Hotel** original buildings sited on the early road for travellers to Sale

**53. Site of early camping grounds** and swimming pool in Traralgon Creek, now Tennis Complex

**54. Stock Bridge** so called as was used as a stock route around the creek

**55. Traralgon Hotel**, known as 'Ryans', classified by National Trust. Earlier hotel on same site served as Post Office and Mines Register

Estimated time 45 to 60 minutes

**Walking Tour 2**

Walking Tour of interest in area east of Traralgon. This was the first area settled in Traralgon in the late 1840's early 1850's

**56. Grave of infant Smyth**, Date unknown. First burials in the area in 1869.

**57. Victory Park**, Purchased and developed by Traralgon Shire Council in 1943

**58. First accommodation house** in Traralgon, owned by Thomas and Elizabeth Windsor. Site now occupied by Wesley Uniting Church

**59. Pine tree**, Victory Park, planted by Traralgon RSL in 1965. Tree grown from seed from tree known as The Lone Pine, Gallipoli

**60. Band Rotunda**, Erected in 1986 through the efforts of Cr R. Seear, then Mayor of Traralgon. Replica of Band Rotunda in Waihalla

**61. Large mountain ash tree stump** placed on site in 1975 as a memorial to early hill country pioneers. Erected by Traralgon Rotary Club

**62. Site of first Presbyterian Church** in Traralgon, built 1878. Site now occupied by Traralgon Ambulance Station

**63. Site of first State School** in Traralgon, built 1872. Site now occupied by private development

**64. Traralgon town pump**, Erected by Traralgon Shire Council in 1877 to save residents the arduous task of bailing water from the creek in buckets

**65. Building known as the Star Hotel**, built in 1875 by George Hickox. This was once on the main road to Sale, but due to the building of a new bridge and the realignment of the road it was not on the main thoroughfare. The subsequent loss of trade forced the re-location of the hotel

**66. Footbridge** over creek in vicinity of area where creek was first forded on main route to Sale in 1860's

**67. Return to Post Office**, Built in 1887, now classified by National Trust

## L.C. Speaks on Pulp Mill

### Company Has Done All Expected

THE course of a long address in the Legislative Council, Mr. J. M. M.L.C., recently touched on subjects which directly concern and included in the questions asked to were Erosion, Gippsland and the Wood Pulp Mill.

With the Pulp Mill, Mr. Bal-

aid:

With regard to the position of the Australian Paper Manufacturers Ltd., I may say that the company has done all that was expected from it under the agreement. It has fulfilled all the obligations entered into with the Minister of Lands and the Forests Commission. The company has deposited in the treasury the sum of £100,000, and is rapidly completing negotiations with a view to debiting a further sum of £25,000, specified in the agreement.

April this year the company is a prospectus relating to 1,000,000 shares, cumulative preference shares of £1 each, and 600,000 of those were taken by the company's shareholders, associated companies, and the officers and members of its staffs.

The prospectus, copies of which I stand at are available, it is shown the money to be raised would be connected with the new operation of the mill in Gippsland, and approximately £600,000 would be for the pulp mill.

Recently the Board of Directors decided the designing, ordering, erection of a new modern paper mill, with an ultimate capacity of 100,000 tons of pulp annually.

The machine is to cost £400,000 and the company is now considering where it should be established in Gippsland or Gippsland. We hope that it will be erected in Gippsland. It will be the development of the original plan for a pulp mill into a paper manufacturing mill. This will be of interest to the people of Victoria, particularly to those residents in Gippsland. Already the company has invited tenders for the timber necessary, and is distributing a large amount of work among the hauliers and people living in the district. The company has been in close co-operation with the different government departments, and also with the shires of Morwell and Traralgon. Already roads have been cut through its property, and a commencement is being made in the building of 4 miles of railway. The company has acquired land at Morwell and Traralgon in order to give its permanent employees sites for residences, and it will assist them to obtain beautiful homes under the "Fondler" system or some other scheme. ## No Sunday Train at Present

MATTER TO BE RECEIVED NEXT SUMMER

WHEN MR. Clapp was at Traralgon, he was asked to extend the Sunday train which now terminates at Moe, to Traralgon. Said the chief of the "iron horse": "Give me some concrete facts of business offering and the commissioners will consider the question." At Morwell a similar request met a similar answer.

Councillor A. L. Hare, of Morwell, who has been interesting himself in the matter has now received the following reply from the secretary for Railways, following still further consideration after Mr. Clapp's verbal reply:—

"Adverting to your request that the Sunday train which at present terminates at Moe be extended to Traralgon, I desire to inform you that the matter has been carefully considered, but exhaustive inquiries clearly indicate that the prospective patronage would not be sufficient to defray the extra expenditure involved.

"In the circumstances, the commissioners regret the desired extension cannot be agreed to at this juncture. The matter will, however, be further reviewed prior to the next summer season, when the weather conditions will be more conducive to day excursion traffic."

So, at least there is still hope in the future.

## A Serious State of Affairs

17 OFFICERS SAID TO HAVE LEFT

Since 1935, wrote the Yarrowong and Border Agricultural and Pastoral Association to the Traralgon society at its annual meeting on Friday, seventeen experienced officers have left the department to take up positions with private concerns. This was a very serious state of affairs and one that should be remedied immediately. To the man on the land the department is of the utmost importance and nothing should be permitted that will in any affect its efficiency.

THE Yarrowong Association further asked for support in the matter so that a strong delegation could be formed to wait on the Premier on a day to be fixed during Melbourne show week. It was also suggested that the assistance of the Parliamentary representative be sought.

Councillor Henderson opened the discussion by asking if the complaint was because the officers of the department were leaving to take up other lines, and wanted to know if it was true.

Mr. T. Y. Anderson said it was quite right. Private concerns came along and offered better inducements. The most brilliant technologists at the university were not getting a salary commensurate with their knowledge. He instanced what had happened in the case of the Sunny South butter factories group.

Mr. Henderson: It is a very unfortunate thing. It was not right that these officers should be leaving on account of salaries.

Mr. Anderson: The government is not paying enough. If a man was only getting £5 a week and someone comes along and offers £8 his is certainly "off."

On the motion of Messrs H. Jones and Mr. Dunbar, it was agreed that the Yarrowong Association be strongly supported in their effort to avert the loss of experienced officers by the department.

# Yearning still for Yallourn

**T**ONIGHT'S performance of Yallourn Story' holds special significance for Amy Tibballs, who lived half her life in the mining town which made the supreme sacrifice for progress.

The 80-year-old holds no bitter feelings towards the SEC; in fact, she speaks highly of its treatment of her.

"I reluctantly accepted Yallourn's fate," Amy said, her youthful eyes misting over as she remembers the "little house at 17 Meadow Lane" she called home for 40 years.

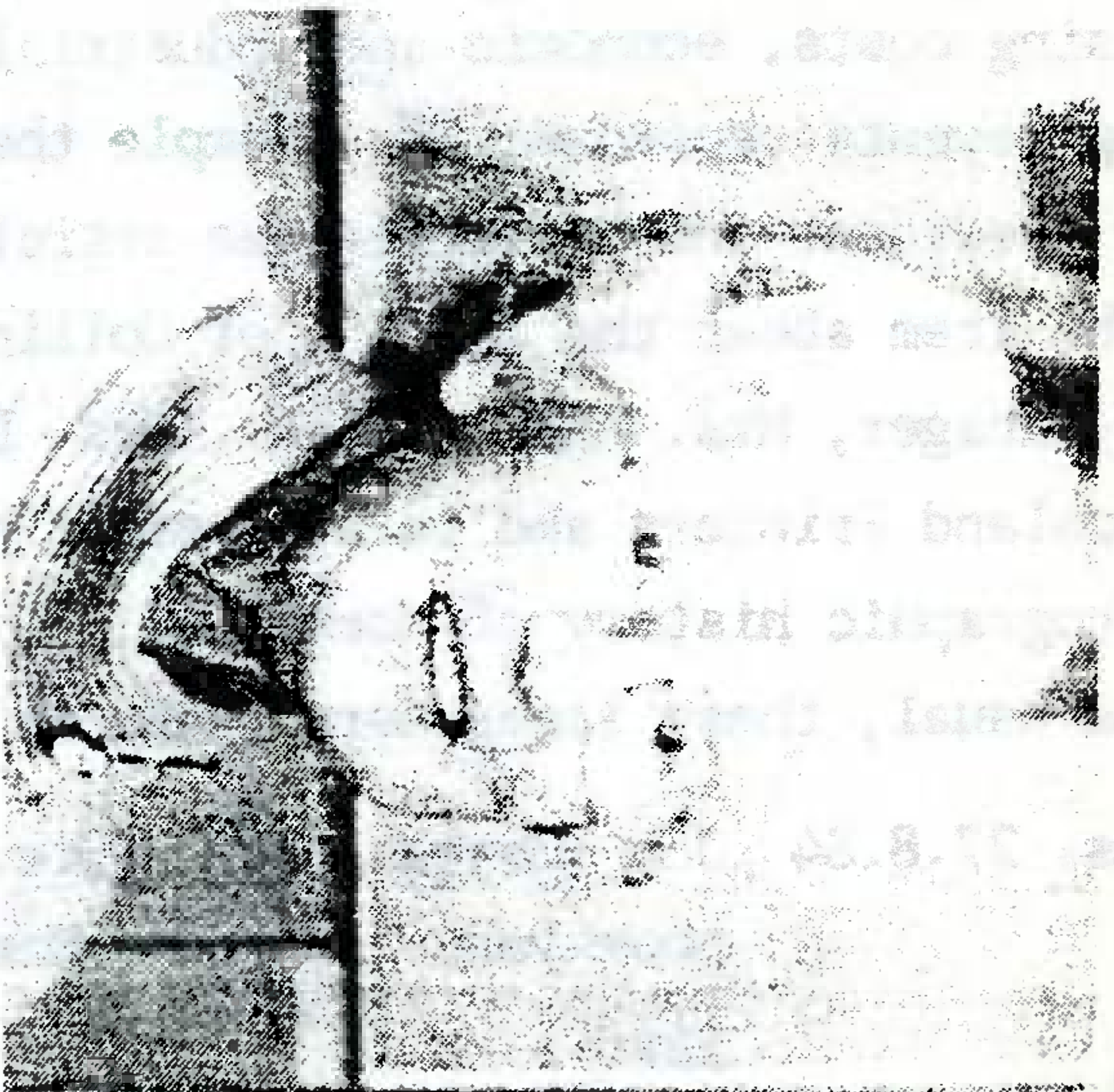
"Yallourn was a very special sort of mining town," Amy said - and she should know, having lived in mining areas all her life. Born in Kalgoorlie, Western Australia, on 18 May, 1909, Amy and her family moved to Victoria when she was eight-years-old, after her mother died. Her family finally settled in Morwell when she was 10 "and I have lived most of my life in the area".

Amy loved her school years in Morwell, and her admiration for the teachers "especially Kathleen Kintoul" led her into a teaching career.

"Schools were different in those days, we were so much more accepting of routine," she remembers. But she did not condone some of the practices of the day: "I never rapped knuckles of left-handers," she said.

Starting as a student teacher at the Great Morwell Coal Mine State School 3967, Amy spent five years at the two-room school before moving to Melbourne.

"I worked at Middle Park School for three years while I studied. I

hated working in the city and couldn't wait to come back to the country."

Amy had her wish and in 1939 returned here, where she taught for a year before marrying and moving to Yallourn.

Like most women of her era, Amy gave up her career to become a full-time housewife, but this didn't last long. In 1948 she was back to the 'drawing board', assisting in the Yallourn Kindergarten. "I wasn't a trained kindergarten teacher, so I went in as an assistant," she explained.

"Yallourn was a very big kindergarten. It was the only 'double unit' kindergarten in the country."

Amy explained that a 'double unit' kinder had two classrooms where separate classes were held for five-year-olds and four-year-olds. "We were

the first kinder in the country to experiment with holding classes for four-year-olds and it was quite successful.

"Because the four-year-old classes were held in the afternoon, the authorities were worried about the children missing out on their nap. But most of them managed. Some children needed a sleep in the afternoon, but mostly they could stay awake for the afternoon sessions," she said.

From Yallourn, Amy was appointed directress of the new Brown Coal Kindergarten, which she said was a great thrill. "I was teaching the children of the children I had taught at school when I first started student teaching," Amy recalled.

After four years at Brown Coal Mine, she taught at Morwell Baptist Kindergarten and then returned again to



Yallourn, where she worked for another five years before retiring with her husband to Inverloch in 1975.

"I was pleased to leave Yallourn before people were being forced out. I could still cry when I think of it," she said.

"Yallourn was different: it was systematically developed; it didn't grow up higgledy-piggledy. There was a kinship that isn't present in a new suburb of Melbourne.

"The situation in Yallourn brought people together, everyone came there for the same reason - to work - and this created a bond which I haven't seen in any other town of its type.

"I don't know how I would have endured seeing my home being taken

away," she admitted, but added that she was pleased to see her "little home is happy again" - it was bought by a young couple and transported to Hazelwood. Amy learned her home had been relocated when she returned to the Valley to live in Orana Village.

"I made the right choice coming back to the Valley," she said, citing a long list of interests which includes playing the piano and local history.

Despite losing the home she loved so dearly, Amy believes she is "one of the luckiest people in the area because of the lovely friends" she has accumulated in her many years of teaching.

The pigs sold at Glengarry in the morning were trucked to Traralgon, where later they were placed in the truck with those from Tinamba. At a recent sale his pigs were forwarded on, but another buyer's were left till the Wednesday. Had they done that sort of thing they would have been "had up" for cruelty. They all knew one buyer had his own transport on the roads. He did not know what happened, but after the above episode it was noticeable that another buyer had also transferred to road transport.



## THE EARLY DAYS

Writing to Mr Walter West, of Traralgon, regarding certain incidents connected with Morwell and Traralgon in the early days, Mr A. S. Kent says:—

"You will remember Strzelecki's trip from Kooralla to Western Port occupying two weeks. Macarthur, one of his party with their blackboy, a man, after arrival in Melbourne, turned to Traralgon in a day and a half and rescued the abandoned horses. Following this route, Dr. Hobson, Herbert Eugene Brodribb, William Bennett and Hugh Reoch set out in August 1844. Dr. Hobson you know well. Brodribb was one of the pioneer family. From is. William A. E. all pioneers especially in Gippsland; William Bennett, brother-in-law of Brodribb (he stayed on at Hazelwood) till 1860; all others named on. Hugh Reoch with Tom Gil at Gin Gin, Beaumont, and later Alfordton, Corinella, etc. Hobson chose Traralgon, that or Traralgon was the name on the spot. After his death Sir Edward, his brother, pioneer on the east coast of Port Phillip, part with James Purves, father of J. Dromana and on his own at Vin Meadows, he'd Traralgon. Brodribb and Bennett picked Hazelwood where Bennett stayed 1860. Meanwhile Thomas Gordon, another Dromana man (Bellarine, Arthur's Seat) came along. He brought the first wheeled vehicle, a dray, into that part of Gippsland. Part of Hazelwood, named after Mrs Bennett, had been cut off by Bennett, Brodribb, Reoch as a run for Dr. Jamieson, U.C., which adjoined Gin Gin but on Gordon's arrival, June 1845, he was allowed to get it. See Meyrick, another Mornington man, and his brothers, James and Henry, came early in 1845 to squeeze in between Hazelwood and Bennett, but he was squeezed out and went on to Genflock (Bellarine's Country) and Tabletabbera, all or Morewill. I have always thought to be a corruption of Maryville, by pronunciation or a composition. They were numerous and lived in the fifties. Traralgon, going to O'Callaghan "Names of the Railway Stations," means companion. It does not mean does it mean the place of shelter. It depends very much on pronunciation. Its most likely origin is—the tribe or men of the place; but it may mean—always the place of much rain."

**North Eastern Historical Society (Wangaratta)** — The declaration of the City of Wangaratta on 15 April 1959 is recorded by Bob Donovan the mayor at the time. Ros Shennan is compiling a biographical Dictionary of the Pioneers of the Ovens and the Townsmen of Beechworth.

**Prahran** — The society is increasing its subscriptions. In June Dr Janet McCalman will talk on 'MLC, Scotch and others — Our Changing Middle Class'. In July Dominic Meadley will advise on tracing your family history.

**Romsey/Lancefield** — On 6 August the society will be visiting the RHSV at the Royal Mint following lunch at Gellibrand Park. The thank you lunch on the 9 April was a great success with over 60 guests and a large list of apologies. The occasion helped to ensure that most of the work on Seymour was complete. The successful outcome on negotiations over the Lancefield Court House is reported. Several members of the society are involved in the Romsey Shire History Book Committee. Donations are still required to assist in financing the project and should be sent to Romsey Shire History Book, P.O. Box 11, Romsey 3434.

**Sandringham** — Robert Barnes was to have talked in May on 'David Collins: The Story behind the myth'. Sixty people participated in the Heritage Week Gipsy Village Walk through Sandringham. A leaflet covering the walk is now available. A plaque was unveiled on the Band Rotunda to commemorate the gift in 1926 of the Rotunda by Dr T. G. S. Leary to the people of Sandringham. The band played while Dr Leary's daughter, Mrs H. Finlay, unveiled the plaque following a speech by the Mayor, Cr M. Hanlin.

**Seymour** — The society celebrates its Silver Jubilee in June. Crossing Place records the conferment by Colonel Lee-Archer of the Council of the RHSV on J. R. Carroll of the Award of Merit. The Shire President participated in the proceedings because he had been a pupil at Seymour High School where Ray Carroll was the Principal. A letter to England written from Goulburn River in 1855 is reproduced. The society is considering creating a life membership for persons who give meritorious or distinguished service to the society. Ray Carroll contributes a note on the Seymour unit of the Victorian Volunteer Cadet Corps.

**Springvale** — A second \$500 donation was forwarded to the Dandenong Journal microfiche project in Heritage Week. An excellent display of photographs, Olympic medals and trophies loaned by local sporting clubs and private residents illustrated the theme 'Our Sporting Heritage'.

**Terang** — The Court House is being advertised for 'expressions of interest'. There is a note on Melbourne's first Mayor, Henry Condell.

**Traralgon** — The Bulletin concentrates on the 1910-1930 era particularly 1914-18. On 4 June. Bill Cuthill of the RHSV Council will perform the book launch of *The Rosedale Story* by Don Macreadie. In June Kathleen Huffer will relate some of her experiences while teaching during the Depression years. The annual report showed a busy society having an effective year. At the annual meeting Jim Dunbar and Kevin Lythgow give an interesting account of the history of Rotary in Australia. This is reprinted. Silver Jubilee of Traralgon was observed on 7-9 April. The new historic trails brochure has been launched. Local groups have combined to produce a dramatic version of "The Yallourn Story" which is running for two weeks from 25 May until 4 June on select dates. Details from 051 346450.

**Warracknabeal** — Jack Kent succeeded Graham Massey as President and Velda McCullough took over responsibilities of Treasurer. The Heritage Week bus tour to Katyl-Antwerp was a success as was the Easter Rally which raised at least \$4000.

**Warragul** — The President, Ian Brooks gave interesting details of the day to day life of William St Leger Forrest, an early selector in the Lardner area. Details are given in the Bulletin which also gives an account of the turning on of the gas lights on 23 January 1889. May 9 was the twentieth anniversary of the opening of the society's museum.

**Warrandyte** — The society's filing system is being brought up to date. It has a number of new items for sale and has acquired additional microfiche records. The society is engaged in negotiations with the City of Doncaster regarding a new home for the museum in the community centre. The newsletter contains a brief history of the Warrandyte Pound from 1854 to 1962.

**Warrnambool** — The society hopes to show a cine-reel of the premier city in 1923 which it has recovered from

the Cinema Club. A successful evening devoted to the earliest memory of Warrnambool was held. The Warrnambool & District Pioneers board has been restored in the Municipal Building foyer. It contains photographs of 204 men together with several water colours. The meeting of the Southern Zone of the WVAHS supported the retention of the Grampians.

**Woody Yaloak** — Heritage Week was successful partly due to effective local publicity.

**W.V.A.H.S.** — The following reports deals with societies which have not reported directly: **Birchip** — On 21 March the historical museum was opened at the old Court house which has been restored with Bicentennial grants. **Camperdown** — On 23 April a plaque to Dunbar Scott was unveiled and the McCabe residence was open to the public. McCabe who was a well known architect lived in 'Keeyuca' which was built in the early 1900s. **Cohuna** — The society received a Bicentennial Heritage Award for its historical centre. **Donald** — Ron Falla received the RHSV Award of Merit from Dr John Lack a member of Council. A special display was mounted during Heritage Week. **Horsham** — Extracts from a document read by Con Dougherty at the turn of the century were read at the February meeting. He was an early settler in Horsham in 1856. **Koroit** — The society has been active in producing a heritage trail and relevant brochures with funds provided from its own sources as well as from the RHSV. **Murtoa** — A Bicentennial Garden has been established. **Midlands** — Five historic markers have been erected in the Tullaroop Shire. The annual dinner on 19 April heard Wendy Jacobs speak on 'Heritage'. **Portland** — The group continues to place bronze plaques on historical buildings and sites. **Stawell** — During Heritage Week the society commemorated the 100th anniversary of the death of Sir William Foster Stawell by unveiling a bronze plaque at the Pleasant Creek Court House. The site of the township of Stawell was proclaimed on 11 June 1858. **Terang** — The Shire of Hampden has suggested a competition for a town crest to mark the 150th birthday celebrations. **Pyramid Hill** — The Pyramid Hill Pioneer Machinery Group staged a display of Australiana at the Melbourne Sheep and Wool Craft Show. The display concentrated on articles concerned with the wool industry. **Warracknabeal** — The society has been able to make good use of a CEP grant to establish a resource centre and train an individual in the use of equipment and material.

The annual meeting was held on 18 March at Kerang. Concern was expressed concerning the disposition of honour rolls in the area. It was decided to apply for incorporation. Venues for future meetings were agreed tentatively as follows: 1990 Terang, 1991 Donald, 1992 Camperdown.

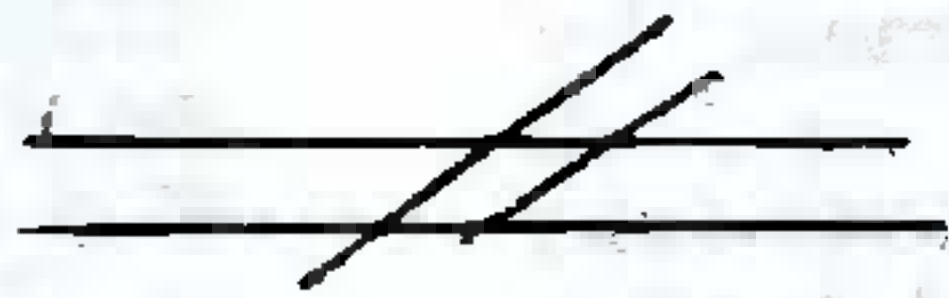

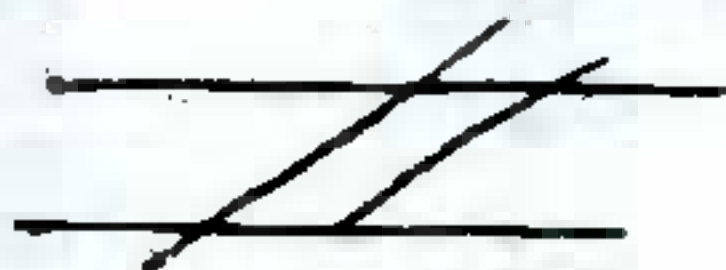
