


WELCOME TO THE MAY NEWSLETTER



UNVEILING OF THE SETTLERS PLAQUE

A very noteworthy occasion was held at a site above the Hazelwood Cemetery on April 24th when a plaque set in a large stone was unveiled marking the achievements of the original fifty-one settlers who were the first to settle on the Hazelwood Estate and District after the 1914-1918 War.

Present at the occasion were the Shire President (Cr. Gloria Auchterlonie), Local MP. Barry Murphy, Yinnar R.S.L. president Merv Little and Mr. Jim Medew (who unveiled the plaque) one of two veterans present.

Mr. Bugg of Morwell R.S.L. acted as Chairman in a capable manner. Mr. Tom Lawless spoke of the efforts of those settlers all of whom had seen war service; giving the names of each and the block numbers they were allotted, stressing the part played by the wives of the settlers.

Several decendants of the original settlers were present. Also a large number of the general public. Morwell Citizens Brass Band also were in attendance and their music was very much appreciated.

At the conclusion of the ceremony the Last Post was played by members of the Band. Cr. Auchterlonie indicated that the Shire had decided to name the site "Anzac Lookout" but are awaiting approval of their decision.

The occasion was a fitting memorial to replace the Hazel-wood Memorial Hall-which was in despair and sold for removal.

At the conclusion of the ceremony those present adjourned to Yinnar R.S.L. where many happy memories were recalled over afternoon tea.

TERMS, CONDITIONS, ETC.

Applications must be made on the prescribed form and lodged with the Secretary, Closer Settlement Board, Public Offices, Melbourne, or with the officer conducting the Inquiry Board. No fee or deposit is necessary. An applicant may apply for more than one allotment, but only one can be granted to any one person.

The capital value, including interest at 5 per cent. per annum, repayable by half-yearly instalments of 6 per cent. per annum over term of 364 years.

Improvements must be effected to the value of at least two instalments of the purchase money before the end of the first year from the date of lease, and 10 per cent of the purchase soney before the end of the third year, and a further 10 per cent before the end of the sixth year.

The lessee must reside on his allotment until the land becomes freehold.

A Crown grant may issue after twelve years, provided the full amount of the purchase money is paid, if the conditions of lease have been complied with.

Advances to a maximum amount of £625 may be made for the purchas of stock and implements, erection of buildings, fencing, &c.

The lessee cannot transfer, assign, mortgage, or sublet the whole or any part of his allotment within the first six years of the leuse, but in case of sickness or adverse circumstances can transfer with the consent of the Board.



MORWELL HISTORICAL SOCIETY

REPORT TO REGIONAL MEETING OF GIPPSLAND HISTORICAL SOCIETIES - MAY 7, 1988.

The past twelve months have been busy and satisfying ones for the members of Morwell Historical Society.

Meetings are held monthly on the third Tuesday, at Collins St. State School, membership has increased to 37, and the Society is in the process of becoming incorporated.

A monthly newsletter contains news, notes and items of interest and reminds members that their presence at the next meeting would be appreciated.

The year's programme has been varied and interesting and has included guest peakers, excursions and joint meetings with neighbouring historical societies.

In keeping with our aim of preserving and recording local history, the Society has contributed financially to the Latrobe Valley Regional Library's project of microfilming copies of the Morwell "Advertiser", 1886-1920.

Discussions have been held with the Road Construction Authority over the fate of two historic palm trees situated close to the new freeway development to the east of Morwell and an assurance has been received that the trees will either be preserved on their present site or moved to another location.

The Society also supported the "Save Mathison Park"Committee in its successful bid to retain Mathison Park, Churchill, as a passive recreation area, in the face of a proposed housing development.

On May 31st, 1987, a memorial to the late Ivan Maddern, educator and historian, as unveiled. The plaque records Morwell Historical Society's appreciation of the contribution made by Ivan Maddern to the Society and of his work in researching and recording the history of the Morwell area.

The main project during the past twelve months has been the copying of photographs of historical significance to the Morwell Shire. A Bicentennial grant allowed the purchase of a copy stand and film, and it is proposed to produce a selection of the photographs in book form next year. The compilation of this pictorial history, in addition to the Society's normal activities, seems likely to keep most of the active members fully involved for the next 12 to 18 months.

The date will be confirmed in the next Newsletter.

1988 BI-CENTENARY YEAR

MORWELL AND DISTRICT

1938-1948- This decade and the next were such momentous ones for our area that we should have no trouble in obtaining reminiscences from members and friends.

War, of course, was the main factor of the period. Its affect on the Latrobe Valley was perhaps more marked than any other area in Victoria. Even by 1938 industry was showing signs of becoming more important to Morwell than agriculture but the war brought the need for a greater utilization of local coal reserves to increase electricity production so the 40's and 50's saw an extra-ordinary industrial expansion and town growth.

But here we want the personal memories of those who lived through these decades.

For example 1938 was a memorable year for Mr. and Mrs. Roy Olver. On the 24th April 1938 they would be celebrating their 10th wedding anniversary. So while the unveiling of the plaque at Hazelwood Estate on the 24th April this year, was proceeding, Mrs. Gladys Olver was probably thinking of her wedding day 50 years ago. But 1938 was also important to this couple for another reason. That year they bought a grocery shop in Commercial Rd., Morwell. Who remembers it? They did not have it for long. When Mr. Olver enlisted in 1940 they sold this business and Mrs. Olver went back to work at the newsagency. She continued to work there until 1975, with the exception of two fortnights when she was 'lent' out by her boss - once to Rintoull's Hardware Shop (Mrs. Nancy Gordon, nee Rintoull, remembers this) and once to Les Linlay's shoe shop.

The Yallourn power station installations made this area very vulnerable to any enemy attack. This meant extra precautions. Who remembers the air-raid shelters, the sand bagged work buildings and the air-raid wardens checking the black out measures? And who remembers the drama of the R.A.A.F. planes on 24/2/1045? Fourteen planes trying to

return to Sale ran into a thick fog. Some got hopelessly lost and crashed. But two through the efforts of Ida Billingsley; air force personnel, Thomas Burley and others, eventually landed safely on a paddock at the corner of Old Melbourne Rd. and Latrobe Rd. at 3 A.M. The light occupants of the planes rested for the remainder of the night at the homes of Leonard Trigg and George J. Billingsley.

The war brought other problems, of course, like the shortage of farm workers. Many had joined the industrial work force of the city and local power production. The inevitable burdens of war were of course felt here as they were throughout the world - ie - loss of life, disruption of families, displacement of families, etc. Peace was followed by that great influx of migrants to the Latrobe Valley that brought growth, changes and problems.

Then there was the trauma of the 1944 fires. It is evident that we'll need space in more than one or two newsletters to cover all your reminiscences for these two decades. This is only an introduction for we'll be looking forward to contributions from all those people who would like to share this journey along memory lane.

HAZELWOOD ESTATE COMMEMORATIVE CEREMONY
HELD AT (ANZAC POINT) THE HAZELWOOD PONDAGE
LOOKOUT POINT BETWEEN HAZELWOOD CEMETERY
AND HAZELWOOD POWER STATION ON 24-4-1988 at 2.00 p.m.

On Sunday April 24th, 1988 a large attendance of our 100 people gathered at the lookout point, overlooking the Hazelwood Cemetary and the Hazelwood Power Station, to commermorate the men of the 1st World War (1914 - 1919), who returned and took up blocks of land on the McMillian blocks bring part of the original McMillian Selection, and taken over by the Closer Land Settlement Commission for returned Soldiers.

Among those present were the President of the Morwell R.S.L. Mr. Mal Bugg, Yinnar R.S.L. President Mr. M. W. Little, Mr. Tom Lawless, who was the main organiser of the gathering, who's father Mr. Jim Lawless was one of the early settlers who took up blocks on the McMillian Estate, Mr.Barry Murphy Member of Parliament, Mr. Ron Waters Executive Officer of the Morwell Shire, and Mrs. Gloria Auchterlonie Mcrwell Shire President.

Mr. Tom Lawless opened proceedings, by introducing Mr. Mal Bugg President of the Morwell R.S.L. who spoke of the reason for this Commemorative Ceremony, which was to have some lasting memorial, of the early pioneers, who farmed the Closer Settlement blocks on the old McMillian Estate.

The Memorial Hall that was erected in the early days of the Settlement, (1924), for the use of the pioneers, is now no longer there, as it had deteriarated to the stage that it had to be pulled down, so this stone, that has been put here today with a plaque, commemorates the work, these pioneers did for the district.

Mrs. Gloria Auchterlonie, President of the Mcrwell Shire, spoke of the work of the Morwell Yinnar and Boolara R.S.L. members who worked with the Morwell Shire Executive Officials in arranging for the procurement of a suitable stone and plague and the suitable position on the Ridge, overlooking the surrounding settlements, where those pioneers settled.

The Shire Council has decided that they will call this point "Anzac Lookout" in commemoration of these early settlers.

Mr. Tom Lawless then spoke of the hardship these early pioneers had to contend with; no roads, no fences, no good pastures, swampy areas, and no water in the summer time for stock, they having to drive their cattle to several creeks in the area, some having to travel a few miles.

He also mentioned the hardship of the wives of those early pioneers, who had to help their husbands with the milking and the other outside work, besides doing their housework in rough conditions, and rear families. These children often had to help with the milking, before and after school, plus other chores that were needed to help to keep these farms viable.

Many of these final occupants failed, and left the farm, which gave the chance for some other returned soldier to try and carry on. Some such farms were split up and divided between neighbouring farms, which helped to make them more viable.

Mr. Tom Lawless read out the names of the first settlers who were allotted from blocks in the Hazelwood Estate.

There were forty-five returned soldiers who were allotted farm blocks in the first settlement. As some of these did not stay long, their blocks were allotted to other soldiers, or divided among others who carried on.

There were other soldier settlers who took up land in close proximity to the other settlers, there being eighteen total, amking fifty-three in all.

Mr. Mal Bugg then asked Mr. Jack Medew who is over ninety years now, he being the only original living settler to unveil the flag from the Commemorative Memorial.

Also at the function was Mr. Marcus Brady, veteran of 1st World War, (over 90 years) although not an early settler. He came into the area in 1940 and worked around the area for some time and knew a lot of the early settlers.

Also present for the occasion was Mrs. Sis Shaw, (also over 90 years now) she being the wife of Mr. Don Shaw one of the early settlers, with her daughter Eva (Mrs. Warrick).

After the ceremony was over Mr. Mal Bugg invited all those present to go to the Yinnar R.S.L. Club rooms for afternoon tea, and also to view old maps of the area and photos.
