

MORWELL'S NEWSPAPERS.

The MORWELL & MIRBOO GAZETTE was first printed on 6th. October 1885 by Mr. Charles PITT-NIND, it consisted of four pages that were hand-set using lead type.

The GAZETTE (date of name change uncertain) office was situated in Station Street (now Princes Drive) next to the METHODIST church which is now the former site of JEPHCOTT's the Jewellers. In 1916 the GAZETTE was owned by a Mr. GILL, in that year he sold the paper to Mr. WATSON of the ADVERTISER.

The MORWELL ADVOCATE and BOOLARRA and MIRBOO CHRONICLE was first published on 30th. October 1886, the publishers were W. SECOMBE and W. KEMP. The paper changed its name to THE ADVERTISER in 1887. Mr. BERT TURNLEY took over the paper in July 1888, he sold to Messrs GUEST and STEPHENS circa 1896. The office was situated in Commercial Road near Chapel Street. On 31st. July 1912 a fire destroyed four buildings in the area, the ADVERTISER premises was one of them, all back issues of the paper housed in the building were lost. The ADVERTISER bought out the GAZETTE in 1916.

Mr GEORGE WATSON who had been editor of the paper for nearly fifty years died in 1942, his son (another George) sold the paper to J. G. LAWLESS in 1944. The ADVERTISER ceased publishing in May 1972.

The LATROBE VALLEY EXPRESS was established in 1965 by Mr. PATRICK HEGARTY, it was bought out by the Elliott Group of newspapers in 1968.

ARMISTICE DAY

November 11 marks the 80th anniversary of the cessation of hostilities at the end of World War 1.

During that war, 361 men and 4 women from Morwell Shire volunteered for service. Their ages ranged from 18 to 44 years - the average age was 24. Of these 361, 9 did not leave Australia, 10 died of disease, 17 died of wounds, 49 were killed in action, 257 returned to Australia and the fate of the other 19 is unknown.

Our President, Stephen Hellings, has compiled a register of the men who had an association with Morwell Shire and who lost their lives as a result of war service. These may have enlisted elsewhere but are connected in some way with our locality - many are recorded on local memorials. The first part of the Register records the men's personal details and war service. The second part is devoted to newspaper articles and notices concerning the servicemen. Entitled 'Lest We Forget', it will be available for reference at the Information Centre.
